HOW DO YOU KNOW IF YOU HAVE THE FLU?

Flu usually comes on suddenly and includes some combination of these symptoms:

- Sudden onset of fever
- Headache
- Chills
- Muscle ache and pain
- Tiredness (can be extreme)
- Cough
- Sore throat
- Mild Pink Eye
- Decreased energy
- Abdominal pain
- Nausea and vomiting (These symptoms alone or with fever are often caused by other factors, not influenza virus)

What's the difference between a Cold and the Flu?

In general, the flu is worse than the common cold. Colds generally do not cause fever or muscle aches nor result in serious health problems. People with colds are likely to have a runny or stuffy nose. If unsure, call your health care provider and explain your symptoms, preferably within the first few days of illness of symptoms.



District Grade Reconfiguration **OVERVIEW**

Background

The Chardon Local Schools are exceptional, ranked in the top 10% of schools in the United States by Niche.com. To maintain the tradition of excellence in education our community has come to expect, we need to continue to operate efficiently and ensure the responsible use of our available fiscal resources.

The district formed an Enrollment Task Force in August of 2017 to address this issue. The group studied district finances, enrollment and building operations to identify scenarios addressing district needs moving forward. Reconfiguration of the current grade/building plan was recommended to address the long-term enrollment and operational needs of the school district.

The proposed reconfiguration plan calls for the closure of Hambden ES, repurposing of Maple ES, and restructuring grade levels in all schools as follows:

Munson ES K-3

Chardon MS 4-7


Park ES K-3

Chardon HS 8-12

Maple Pre-K Program (Reuse of building)

Why do we need to reconfigure?

Like other districts in our area, the Chardon Local Schools saw a peak in enrollment in 2004-05 and the number of students continues to decline since that time. Schools that were once overcrowded are now seeing uneven class sizes. The chart below shows the district's 40-year enrollment trend (red) and future projections (black),



As enrollment declines, it becomes more challenging to operate schools efficiently. Class sizes become demanding to manage, with fewer sections across four elementary schools, and it becomes more difficult to maintain programming in a cost-effective manner for fewer students.

Coupled with declining enrollment is an increasingly challenging funding picture for our schools. The Ohio Legislature enacted a budget in 2017 that cut one million dollars in state funding to Chardon Schools <u>each year</u>. When you look at our revised five-year forecast, the district projects a 12-million dollar operating deficit in 2022 unless steps are taken to operate more efficiently.

Finding a way to overcome our budget shortfall, and responding to a declining enrollment in a way that doesn't impact students, is the challenge we face as a school district and community. Our Strategic Plan, board-adopted in 2015, recognized this need and included a specific strategy to review enrollment and building usage for opportunities to increase efficiency.

What is in it for our students?

In a traditional way of thinking, school districts look to maintain the current system and cut budgets when faced with deficits. Because schools typically spend 80 percent of their money on staff, these reductions largely come in the form of cuts to personnel that affect the programs, services and experiences that serve students.

In short, traditional budget cuts have a negative impact on students, diminish the quality of education that districts can offer, and, ultimately, erode the quality of education that community members have come to expect from their schools.

Under the reconfiguration proposal, the projected savings come as the result of reducing additional staff and operational costs that come with operating four smaller elementary schools. There are no cuts in programs, services or opportunities that students receive in Chardon Schools. In fact, there are some real pluses as a result of grade reconfiguration including:

- More stable/lower class sizes in grades K-5
- Increased focus on literacy and mathematics in the early grades
- Increased instructional time in key content areas for grades 4-7
- Increased opportunities for grade acceleration for gifted students in grades 4 and 5
- Personalized mentorship for grades 8-12
- Improved access to HS credit courses for 8th grader students
- Increased mentoring and career exploration for 8th grade students



District Grade Reconfiguration **OVERVIEW**

What is in it for our staff/faculty?

Teaching is an increasingly complex job with new curricular standards, state assessments, and a wide range of student needs. Chardon is proud to have some of the best in the business when it comes to educating our students. Finding ways for teachers to work together to plan and deliver the highest quality instruction is important to our continued success.

Under reconfiguration, teachers will see increased instructional time in some areas, more opportunity to collaborate and improve the quality of instruction, and the preservation of current programs and services important to the continued success of our students.

What is in it for our taxpayers?


In addition to students and parents, we also must consider the expectation of our broader community of taxpayers that we need to continue exploring ways to operate our schools as efficiently as possible. Consider that about 75 percent of the residences in any school district do not have school-age children and they expect that we identify all possible cost-saving measures in operating our schools.

Chardon Schools is a leader in identifying cost-reduction opportunities in all areas. From replacement of lighting fixtures to cut energy costs, replacement of an outdated, and expensive telephone system, to participation in purchasing groups for supplies and materials, we are committed to constantly evaluating ways that preserve our fiscal resources and deliver the same (or better) services to our community.

All of this is done in an effort to slow the number of times we need to ask taxpayers to support a new tax levy, and to instill confidence that when we do, the need is real.

How will it impact district finances?

Our school district is facing a significant challenge with the continued loss of state funds. Our current five year forecast estimates a \$12 million dollar deficit by 2022. The chart below shows projected revenue, expenditures and the spend-down of our current balance. We cannot operate in a cash deficit, so we need to find ways to reduce the budget given that we are on a fixed income that is actually declining due to cuts by the Ohio Legislature.



Under the district reconfiguration proposal, we are estimating \$2 million dollars per year in operational savings largely due to a reduction in personnel. Combined with the passage of a critical 3.9 mill operating levy that will appear on the May 18 ballot, the district projects a more stable financial outlook for the future.

It is important to understand that financial projections, especially beyond 2 years, are subject to change due to unknown factors, but it is clear that there are significant savings to be gained through reconfiguration that do not reduce programs and services in our schools. The impact on our community will be to slow down the levy cycle.

The May 2018 operating levy is an important, and necessary, consideration along with reconfiguration, and will cost the local taxpayer \$11.38 per month per \$100,000 of market home value.
